

Voting in the Village of Paddock Lake



Your goal is for each eligible voter to be able to cast a ballot and have that ballot counted.

Voter Eligibility

To be eligible to vote, you must be:

- United States citizen
- Age 18 or older by Election Day
- Resident of Paddock Lake for at least 28 consecutive days before the election
- Finished serving sentence, including probation/parole, if convicted of felony

Voter Registration

Up to 20 days before an election you may register to vote at the Municipal Hall with proof of address.

You may register in the Municipal Hall with proof of address through the Friday before an election.

On Election Day you can register to vote at the polling place with proof of address.

Proof of Address

When registering, you need to present one of the following documents—either in paper or electronic format—showing your current name at your address:

- WI driver license or WI state ID card
- Utility bill from last 90 days (water, gas, electric, cable, internet, landline, or cellular phone)
- Bank or credit union statement
- Property tax bill or receipt
- Government document or check
- Paycheck
- Residential Lease (a lease cannot be used when registering by mail)
- Affidavit on letterhead from a public or private social service agency that is providing services to a homeless voter
- College fee statement from last 9 months, with student ID

Voting Absentee

Absentee ballots are kept sealed and secure in the Clerk's Office vault until counted at the polls on Election Day.

You may vote absentee in the Clerk's Office between 8 a.m. and 4:30p.m. weekdays, ending the Friday before an election.

Voting Absentee by Mail

To receive an absentee ballot by mail, submit a written request containing:

- Your name
- Address where registered to vote
- Address where ballot should be sent
- Your signature

Send the Clerk a copy or picture of your ID along with your absentee request.

It is a felony to vote at the polls if you have returned an absentee ballot to the Clerk's Office.

In order for your absentee ballot to be counted, you must:

- ✓ Sign the certificate envelope.
- ✓ Have a witness sign the envelope.

Hospitalized Voters

You may vote absentee if you are hospitalized on Election Day or during the week before an election. Use the hospitalized absentee request form from the Village Clerk.

You will appoint someone as an agent to bring your request and your ID to the Clerk's Office. The Clerk's Office will give your absentee ballot to your agent. After you have voted, your agent will return your ballot to the Clerk's Office.

Election Day

Polls open at 7 a.m. and close at 8 p.m. Everyone in line at 8 p.m. gets to vote.

If you move within 28 days of an election you can only vote from your previous address, at your old polling place.

Voters with mobility issues or difficulty waiting in line may vote from the curb of their polling place.

Voters must sign or make their mark on the poll book. Voters unable to sign due to a disability are exempt from this requirement.

To vote, fill in the oval next to the name of your candidate. Insert your ballot in the tabulator and wait for a thank you message.

Voter ID

Wisconsin requires voters to show ID. The following types of ID are acceptable:

- Wisconsin driver license or Wisconsin DOTissued photo ID card expiring 11/4/14 or later
- U.S. Passport expiring 11/4/14 or later
- Military ID card expiring 11/4/14 or later
- Certificate of naturalization issued within last 2 years
- Unexpired Wisconsin driver license or DOTissued photo ID receipt
- Unexpired ID card issued by a federally recognized Indian tribe in Wisconsin
- Wisconsin accredited university/college 1D with issuance date, signature, and expiration within 2 years of issuance, and <u>proof of current</u> enrollment.
